Chairman's Report

I was also very proud that sailing Olympic Silver medallist Luke Patience agreed to become an Ambassador.

2013 was a very productive year: our crews enjoyed some spectacular voyages and our shore based team secured great accolades.

We took 650 young people sailing on our yachts; 71% received accredited Royal Yachting Association certificates; our volunteers completed 361 training opportunities and assessments and in our Young Leader's Development Programme, twelve participants sailed around Ireland and remain involved as committed volunteers.

It is worth noting that these highlights were achieved despite a very challenging market which resulted in a manageable deficit at the year end. Thanks to my Board and staff team we have reviewed our operations and plotted a new course to reduce operating costs whilst unlocking longer term financial support. This was one of my themes when I spoke at the launch of our new training vessel in June 2013 and I am delighted that we have made excellent inroads on this front.

Not only are we greatly indebted to the constant and most welcome support from our wonderful patrons, Barbara and Curly Mills, but we have also recently secured three years of committed Scottish Government funding from its Cashback for Communities initiative: our thanks go to the Justice Minister Kenny MacAskill MSP for his support of this project. Our staff are working hard to supplement this investment with

other long-term investors to enable us to plan more strategically.

2013 saw positive strategic movements for the Trust, including OYT Scotland Ambassador Stuart McMillan MSP hosting a parliamentary reception for the Minister for Children and Young People. However, one of our biggest achievements still remains our recruitment of volunteers - over 80 joined us this year. To you all - welcome on board.

I was also very proud that sailing Olympic Silver medallist Luke Patience agreed to become an Ambassador. His enthusiasm for the Trust's aims is clear and we look forward to working with him in the years ahead.

As for 2014, whilst Alba Venturer is temporarily laid up, we have a full programme on two big boats and our small volunteer training vessel of 57 youth voyages for 569 young people; 26 sea-staff training courses; five promotional day sails; and six fundraising challenges and two private charters to generate income towards the cost of adventure under sail for young people.

Exemplifying our determination to improve how we work, innovative projects in 2014 include: fully implementing our new Safety Management System (three years in the making); creating a new two day residential CPD course delivered at sea for teachers and youth workers; and becoming an approved Training Centre by the Scottish Qualifications Authority. This will expand our range of

accredited qualifications, beginning with the SQA Leadership Award integrated into our Young Leaders Development Programme.

Thanks to the Big Fund's Young Start programme we are able to continue that particular programme and the Skippership Scheme; training a new generation of volunteer and professional sea-staff and providing varied skills and qualifications for life and work ashore

Finally I would like to extend my thanks to our Board for their support this year and acknowledge the contribution of those members who stepped down. On the Board's behalf I warmly thank the Trust staff and volunteers who continue to do excellent work inspiring young people whilst at sea.

In 2013

In 2013 **63** youth voyages provided **3870** berth nights for **650** young people (compared with 4788 berth nights on 90 voyages in 2012) PLUS **728** berth nights taken up by our young volunteers.

Our Assisted Berth Scheme contributed **£71,151** (compared with 103,925 in 2012) towards the voyage fees of disadvantaged young people.

Our boats

Our boats Alba Explorer, Alba Endeavour, Alba Venturer and Alba Volunteer sailed 16,000 miles visiting towns, villages, islands and remote sea lochs along the length of the Scottish west coast and further afield to Isle of Man and a circumnavigation of Ireland.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Despite successes, 2013 proved to be very difficult financially. Total resources expended were just over 3% ahead at £937,067, but voyage sales were some 30% down on the previous year. Approximately 50% of our income is generated from voyage sales, merchandising, and membership fees. The other 50% is fundraised. Total incoming resources at £776,840 brought out a deficit of £160,227.

The Trust aims to maintain a level of unrestricted reserves so as to provide for three months operating costs. Our General Fund balance stands at £197,097, and so meets this aim. We are free of any loans, and have solid cash reserves, and by working at matching capacity with demand, we are confident of a stronger performance in 2014.



FUNDRAISING

Overall fundraising income was £386k in 2013. The financial climate and staff resources necessitated some changes to plans but notable new income was a substantial legacy from Jim Piggins, a long-serving member and friend of OYT/OYC and £50k from the Big Fund's Young Start programme for peer volunteer training.

Meeting the challenge of adventure under sail head on, our charity challenges raised an amazing £58k thanks to teams from Barclays, KPMG and Deutsche Bank and guests. In a weather window, the inaugural St Kilda Challenge made it safely to the iconic Scottish islands. Congratulations to ALL the crews and particularly John McMillan who raised over £6k

Despite the loss of an annual core grant from The Scottish Government, we are delighted that it has through YouthLink Scotland, continued to support the costs of our annual seminar and Volunteer Co-ordinator. Likewise we are particularly grateful for the sustained support of Crerar Hotels Trust and Bank of Scotland Foundation (for the Assisted Berths Scheme) and, indeed, that of our Patrons.

Looking to the future needs of the Trust, additional resources have been put in place to develop our fundraising capacity.
